I'm so excited that you have decided to join us for the 2nd Outer Banks Environmental Film Festival. I'm so proud that this is part of our educational outreach of the Peace Garden Project, a nonprofit working at the intersection of food and environmental justice https://www.peacegardenproject.net.

It is exciting to bring the Outer Banks Environmental Film Festival back for a second year, here to my ancestral home, a place once home to a thriving Alonquin-speaking Roanoac people. I feel deeply connected to the sea and the desire to protect creation.

As our festival grows, we hope you'll continue to be with us, inviting your friends, and helping to tell the stories of people and planet.

This year, Finding Hope in the Climate Crisis, the official podcast of the Outer Banks Environmental Film Festival launched. As a part of the festival you'll have the opportunity to take part in live podcast recordings. I continue to hope the films inspire us to work together across race, class, ethnicity, and borders to conserve and increase access to cultural and natural resources in our communities. The films this year will bring us love and humor, joy and pain, heartache and beauty. We have so much work ahead of us, but together we will work toward more environmentally just communities for all.


"HAWA" AWARD ARTISTS

ALEXIS JOYNER AND HANNA JUBRAN




ALEXIS JOYNER


"I often address social issues and concerns and I like to gently remind young folk that they don't need to reinvent the wheel." A native of Southampton County, Virginia, Alexis Joyner created his first thee-dimensional pieces at age 12 by carving faces on waking sticks and canes. His first large wood piece, Cherry, a depiction of Nat Turner's wife rendered in black walnut is an homage to the legendary slave revolt of 1831 that occurred in the county where Joyner was born. his graduate studies at Norfolk State University and Old Dominion University earned him a Master of Fine Arts in Sculpture in 1984. Following a decade as a pubic school educator, "Professor Joyner retired from Elizabeth City State University, serving for a time as department chair during his 29 years there.




HANNA JUB RAN

We are honored Professor Joyner conceptualized and sculpted the "Hawaiian" award statue for the Outer Banks Environmental Film Festival. He said. "I've been thinking about this piece for a while." And aptly named the statue "Hawaiian" which means Eve in Arabic, Hebrew, and Swahili. In English, "Hawa" means air, atmosphere, the gases surrounding the Earth or any astronomical body. The air in a particular place (Wikipedia)." Hanna Jubran cast the "Hawa" statue in bronze. Of Palestinian origin, born in Josh in Upper Galilee, he holds an MFA in sculpture from the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee. Professor Jubran teaches Sculpture at East Carolina University, where he sculpted the school's mascot, Pee Dee "The Pirate." Jubran also sculpted "A Monument to a Century of Flight" in Kitty Hawk, North Carolina.

In Ocean Seen From the Heart, the sequel to Heart Seen from the Heart, Hubert Reeves, surrounded by passionate scientists and explorers, invites us to rediscover what threatens it and, above all, its phenomenal capacity for regeneration.

GIANTS OF THE DEEP: THE WHALE SHARK STORY DIRECTED BY: DR. ALONGKOT CHUKAEW

A journey of a young scuba diver, Narida (Claire) Charanachitta, an avid 14-year-old girl who has been exploring the gulf of Thailand and the Andaman sea in the western part of Thailand in a search of the rare find, the whale shark. Claire's attempt to follow the story of the whale shark, an endangered species and is one of the 20 species of protected wildlife in Thailand.

WHALES OF THE HIGH DESERT DIRECTED BY: JOSEPH ADAM LEBARON

Whales of the High Desert explores the story of James Wickham; an Englishman who was reported to have brought whales to Great Salt Lake in the 1870's. Professor of Folklore, Dr. Lynne McNeill acts as our guide through the history and origin of Wickham's tale, and shares with us why paying attention to his story today can secure the health future of Great Salt Lake.


SANDCASTLE - THE SECRET LIFE OF POTTER WASPS DIRECTED BY: ROMAN WILLI



"Hidden in Plain Sight" shines a light on a rarely discussed aspect of the safari industry, uncovering the pervasive economic leakage and exploitation perpetuated by foreignowned companies across Africa.

West African waters have been overexploited for more than 40 years, largely by foreign fleets from Europe, Russia and Asia. The collapse of fish stocks threatens fishermen and their families, an important part of Senegalese society.


REIMAGINING QUEEN NANNY OF THE MAROONS DIRECTED BY: UDEMBA MCLEAN&LEO R DOUGLAS

FL*SHING INJUSTICE DIRECTED BY: ASTRID MALTER

Sherry Bradley and Perman Hardy met on an ordinary Friday afternoon. Amid national and international media recognition of the egregious sanitation and health challenges facing counties across the Black Belt, they helped create an extraordinary consortium of community members, academic institutions, nonprofits, and government agencies dedicated to finding practical solutions for wastewater issues throughout the Black Belt in Alabama.





THE ASH WEDNESDAY STORM DIRECTED BY: RAYMOND WALLACE

The Ash Wednesday Storm of 1962 mini documentary features several never-before-documented stories of survival of the storm, which wreaked havoc on Nags Head for three days. The first hand accounts, provided by Nags Head residents, are shared to highlight how unpredictable and dangerous Outer Banks weather can be.

LIVING BY THE LAKE DIRECTED BY: JONATHAN E JACKSON

Beverly Shores, Indiana, is a small lakefront town that is increasingly threatened by the rising water level of Lake Michigan. The residents watch as the encroaching tides of this Great Lake eat away at the dunes in front of their homes. After a series of big wave storms, a road, and a car park in the town collapse into the lake. As a last resort, and to protect their town, the spirited residents of Beverly Shores come together to build a wall of Armourstone rocks stretching along, what once was their beach.

Ca WAYA, SAVING OUR RED GRANDFATHER DIRECTED BY: JENNIFER LOREN

The Red Wolf is not only the most endangered wolf in the world, it's quite possibly the most misunderstood. In this 30-minute documentary, we explore the Red Wolf's cultural significance to the Cherokee people and why conservationists hope indigenous knowledge will help save it from extinction.

The story of a rural community that inspired an international environmental justice movement by fighting the state of North Carolina's toxic landfill.




OWYHEE CANYONLANDS DIRECTED BY: A.J. CARTER AND LAUREN BOGARD

Covering millions of acres of sagebrush, river canyons, and geologic wonders, the Owyhee Canyonlands is the largest conservation opportunity in the American West. The vast, intact ecosystem is home to hundreds of bird species, mule deer, pronghorn, lizards and reptiles, and myriad plants and insects. Due to its remoteness, it boasts some of the darkest night skies in the lower 48. The region is the ancestral homeland of the Northern Paiute, Bannock, and Shoshone peoples.




BITTERSWEET MUCK DIRECTED BY: SASHA JONES

The people who live in Belle Glade and the other small towns along the southern edge of Lake Okeechobee are hard-working, passionate, and inspiring people who live in an area known for its unique, nutrient- rich soil, known as Muck.







MAURI DIRECTED BY: ZAYA BENAZZO, MAURIZIO BENAZZO


Mauri explores intergenerational trauma and the loss of indigenous identity experienced by the native people of Aotearoa (New Zealand). It also contrasts Māori traditional healing practices, which provide a holistic approach to well-being, with Western therapeutic traumahealing methods, disconnected from the indigenous worldviews and relationships.

SICK-AMOUR: A LOVE STORY DIRECTED BY:JOEL TAUBER

Sick-Amour: A Love Story celebrates the forlorn and lonely Tree that Joel Tauber adopts in the middle of a giant parking lot in front of the Rose Bowl Stadium in Pasadena (CA, USA). The 77-minute documentary—which was filmed over the course of 18 years—paints a multifaceted portrait of the Tree via a series of interviews with experts in different fields; while it chronicles Tauber's efforts to improve the Tree's life.

RADICAL LOVE: THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF SATISH KUMAR DIRECTED BY:JULIO HEY

Best known for his 8,000-mile walk for peace, former monk, activist, author and educator Satish Kumar has been inspiring global change for nearly 70 years. Between his home in the south of England and an experience returning to India, the documentary "Radical Love" portrays his impressive journey, presenting a collection of vivid projections of what can be accomplished when our presence in the world is filled with the powers of simplicity, collaboration and love.

Daniel Balima is a senior horticulturist from
Tenkodogo, a small Sub-Saharan African town in
Burkina Faso, where he lives with his large family and
has worked since he was born 67 years ago.
Daniel as a child falls ill with polio and, although
growing without the use of his legs, he is able to
follow his father in the family nursery, walking on his
hands. He works immediately with great passion and
talent so much that his disability, which for many in
Africa means a marked destiny, is for Daniel an
opportunity: "I could take two paths: begging or
taking my life in hand and devoting myself to work
with dignity ".




